
CURRENT LANDSCAPE OF OPEN







- OER allows for knowledge to be place-based
- Formalize OER within an established office or unit to ensure continuity
- Explore the impact of Open on student success
- Tie Open to institutional objectives and priorities (e.g., strategic plan)
